# CLARIFYING YOUR VOCATIONAL CALLING

or some, the desire to serve God in a specific vocation has burned within them for years. Others recall a moment when they "just knew" that they were called to serve. 
### RESPONDING TO THE CALL

#### **James Clark**

While attending Garrett-Evangelical part-time, James works full-time in commercial real estate investment banking and is a husband and father of two.



"I come from a family of pastors, so I've grown up knowing there was a call all my life. Like many, you tend to fight it, or run from it, or rebel, and I've been through all those stages. It's probably taken me 20 years to finally come to terms with it and acknowledge it. I don't know what I'm going to be doing in 3 years or 5 years. I'm more focused on being on the right path now and being confident that that path will take me to where I'll need to be. As I take each step, the path gets a little clearer."

"At first, it didn't even occur to me that ministry was an option. I had this altruistic goal in my life of helping people, so I thought I'd major in psychology. Then it occurred to me one day, as I was sitting in the lab doing

#### **Candy Krider**


Master of Arts student, Middlebury, Indiana

I started to sense a call into full-time ministry work 5-6 years ago. I ran away from it for awhile, but God showed me through many different people and many different avenues that it wasn't going to go away. I went into prayer and realized the call was still there."

Our rigorous and stimulating academic curriculum is balanced by our commitment to practical learning and application through a strong field education program. 
## THE CULTURE OF GARRETT-EVANGELICAL



arrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary is a graduate school of theology of The United Methodist Church located on the campus of Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. It serves over 450 students. While the seminary is affiliated with The United Methodist Church, students from a number of denominations, as well as cultural backgrounds, foster an atmosphere of ecumenical interaction.

### History

The seminary began in 1853 as Garrett Biblical Institute. Its current name comes from a union of Garrett Theological Seminary and Evangelical Theological Seminary in 1974.

#### Location

The seminary's ideal location in north suburban Evanston, just minutes from Chicago and on the shore of Lake Michigan, provides access to the city's rich historical, cultural, and ethnic resources.
